July 5, 2020 – Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Exegesis on this Sunday's readings

Zechariah 9:9-10 | Psalm 145:1-2, 8-9, 10-11, 13-14 | Romans 8:9, 11-13 | Matthew 11:25-30

This is our first time to celebrate a Sunday in Ordinary Time since March 6, just before we began the Lenten season. For four months, we have celebrated different liturgical seasons designed to help us remember and follow the life, death, and Resurrection of Christ and the life of the early Church communities as they attempted to imitate him. From now until the final Sunday in November, when we will begin a new Advent season, we will hear about Jesus' mission and his message of Good News. We will hear, too, about the followers who carried on his mission in the world.

The last few verses of today's Gospel passage begin with "come to me" and are unique to Matthew. The invitation to come to know Jesus and learn from him will show followers the demands of discipleship. The "yoke" of discipleship calls one to live with humility, openness, and willingness to enter into relationship with God in and through Jesus his Son. Jesus Christ is the key to knowing the mysteries of God's kingdom.

Dear Cathedral Basilica Ohana,

Greetings of peace, love, and joy!

"Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11: 28)

Do you ever have someone in your life whom you can rely on, especially during the difficult times of your life? When you are troubled and discouraged, do you have a family member or a close friend whom you can unload that burden you are carrying on your shoulders? If you have, does that person listen to you intently and empathize with you? There is no doubt that all of us have burdens in life. It is for this reason why He carried His cross to the Mount of Calvary so that we can find in Him the strength we need when we are overwhelmed by our burdens in life.

When we find strength and courage in Jesus in carrying our burdens, our faith in Him will enable us to assist those needing our help. We often hear the words, "no man is an island," for indeed, it is true. We are meant to live with everyone and anyone. And if we have faith in the Lord, we become that person helping the others that they may find rest as well.

As we all journey in life and faith, may Jesus be with us. May we also be with and for one another, especially during these difficult times. May we truly find in Jesus the rest we long for not only in the life to come but even here and now.
